An Evolving Trajectory

Dear Friends,

As the days in Erlangen are getting longer again, the winter term is coming to an end. Over the past months, a stimulating program of lectures, colloquia and workshops has tremendously enriched our perspectives on matters that are at the core of CAS-E's research activities.

While, thus far, we have explored in depth questions around "What makes a practice 'esoteric'?" and "How (if at all) do such practices transform, in order to adapt to fast changing, progressively connected contexts?", lately, our attention is increasingly drawn towards the power dynamics that, not only, underpin esoteric practices themselves but, also, inform the very formulation of such questions—and who gets to ask them. This translates into crucial queries, such as, "According to whom is a practice deemed 'esoteric'?", "What are the limits of studying esoteric practices academically?", "Can such limits be overcome and, if so, how?", "If not, why may this be the case?", and "What does this mean for the study of esoteric practices, moving forward?". We believe that these are urgent questions, whose relevance extends well beyond our center, and which need to be addressed collectively from multiple disciplinary, methodological and regional perspectives, on numerous levels. We are also convinced that CAS-E is uniquely and optimally positioned to spearhead such conversations and that these will have important ramifications for the wider fields of Esoteric Studies and Religious Studies in the years to come.

Below, you can find out about some of the outcomes of CAS-E's ongoing engagement with these matters and their embeddedness in praxis. In particular, we want to bring to your attention the imminent publication of two peer-reviewed special issues: one that presents the research proposal that led to the establishment of CAS-E and scholarly responses to it; and one that gathers essays written by CAS-E members and alumni on speaking with spirits. We are also excited to announce that the first volume of the CAS-E book series *Esoteric Practices: Global Perspectives*, published by Brill, is under review. These are the first of a series of publications edited by the CAS-E team, featuring the work of CAS-E members and alumni, collectively and individually. Further outcomes of our latest debates are the CAS-E panels we plan to hold at the international

conference of the European Society for the Study of Western Esotericism (ESSWE).

As always, we invite you to join the conversation on these important topics every Tuesday during term time at our CAS-E lecture series, or during one of our forthcoming workshops.

Finally, we would like to bid farewell to those fellows who leave at the end of this term, while we get ready to welcome new ones when we reconvene in Erlangen in April.

An excerpt from the "Afterword" (p.147) to the special issue illustrates the increasing role that the awareness of matters around power has been playing in CAS-E's latest analytical developments:

[W]e need to be aware that resemblances are not merely 'there', waiting to be 'discovered' by researchers but, rather, that they also depend on the situatedness of those who "look and see", and assess these said resemblances. Thus, the task of the researchers includes critically investigating the sedimented practices of looking and comparing as well as the epistemic interests and presuppositions that inform our intuitions. In other words, if adapting the concept of "family resemblances" is not to become theoretically and methodologically evasive, it is necessary to interrogate "why specific features are taken into account and on what grounds similarities are declared" (Maltese et al 2019: 11)

Comparing Esotericisms: Experimenting in Collaborative Authorship, panel chaired by <u>Birgit Menzel</u> and <u>Bernd-Christian Otto</u> at <u>ESSWE</u> Esotericism and Rationality, Vilnius University, Lithuania, June 26–28, 2025.

 This panel presents an introduction and two tandem-papers of an experiment in collaborative, cross-disciplinary co-authorship. The presenters are part of CAS-E and explore this kind of writing as a distinct comparative methodology. The papers will be published, along with others, in an upcoming book, with the aim of bringing new life into the comparative enterprise in the humanities.

 The panel presents and compares papers from a special issue organised by CAS-E to explore the apparent resilience of esoteric practices from a global and largely contemporary perspective, against the backdrop of the global proliferation and hegemonic power of scientific and technological rationalities as well as the continued marginalisation and delegitimisation of esoteric practices in discourses orchestrated by religious orthodoxies or political regimes.


Ethnographic Writing Workshop "Weaving the World" by CAS-E permanent fellow Prof. Paul Stoller

The aim of this workshop is to introduce participants to the fundamental features and essential practices of writing ethnography and creative non-fiction. The primary objective of the course is to show participants how to sensuously describe ethnographic spaces, sounds and characters. Participants will engage in writing exercises that enable them to "Weave the World," a seamless linkage of sensuous description and social analysis. Participants will also be asked to read examples from the work of writers (including ethnographers) who have, in various ways, successfully used « weaving the world » techniques to evoke places and spaces, develop dialogue and craft character. By the end of the course, participants will have practiced writing strategies that they can use to ensure that their future readers come to know a people who live in a particular place. During the workshop participants will be asked to write culture evocatively. The instructor will outline ethnographic writing practices—the "tricks of the trade." He will then ask the participants to begin to "Weave the World" by writing (1) descriptions of space/place, (2) dialogue and (3) character portraits.



Paul Stoller is Permanent Fellow at CAS-E, FAU Erlangen-Nuremberg. He is the author of 16 books. For more than 15 years, he has been facilitating ethnographic writing workshops in Europe, North American and West Africa. His latest book is *Wisdom from the Edge: Writing Ethnography in Turbulent Times* (2023). In 2013 the King of Sweden awarded him the Anders Retzius Gold Medal in Anthropology.

Hidden Knowledge and Ritual in Indigenous South America and Beyond

This workshop, organized by CAS-E alumnus <u>Dr. Juan Rivera</u>, is dedicated to the comparative exploration of hidden knowledges and ritual practices in four

dimensions of life among contemporary indigenous groups in South America (and some comparable areas beyond this region): those closely related to sounds (i.e., production of music and other sonic beings), images (i.e., iconography and chromatism), bodies (i.e., rituals linked to shamanism, healing, witchcraft, and sorcery), and subsistence practices (such as fishing, hunting, agriculture, and herding). Invited guests will be mainly ethnographically trained social anthropologists, but also ethnomusicologists, sociologists, linguists and ethnohistorians, whose research would be preferably based on their own long-term fieldwork on contemporary indigenous societies of South America and beyond.


Spirit Writing

Prof. Dr. Michael Lackner

Michael Lackner is spokesperson for CAS-E and senior professor of Sinology at FAU. His research focuses on the intellectual and religious history of the Chinesespeaking world. He is a senator of the German National Academy Sciences (Leopoldina) and co-editor the International Journal of Divination and Prognostication and the book series Prognostication in published History (both Brill/Leiden). He was a member of the Wissenschaftskolleg zu Berlin and the Princeton Institute for Advanced Study and is currently leading the "The research project Global Confucian Analects".

Birgit Menzel is professor for Russian Literature and Culture at the University of Mainz, where she has taught at the Faculty for Translation and Interpretation. She has published on Occultism. Altered States of Consciousness, Parapsychology and Transhumanism in Russia. current research project is "New Religious Movements in Late and She Post-Soviet Russia". permanent fellow at CAS-E, where she co-organizes open seminars and the project "The Esoteric in Films", and fosters partnership with the IGPP Freibura.

Dr. Isabell Herrmans



Knowing Hands: Chinese Hand-memory Techniques and Handy Knowledge in Situ, Comparison, and Contact

CAS-E is thrilled to announce the international research project "Knowing Hands: Chinese Hand-memory Techniques & Handy Knowledge in Situ, Comparison, and Contact," commencing in April 2025 for a duration of thirty-six months. "Knowing Hands" is a joint German-French collaboration between Prof. Marta Hanson (CAS-E, Erlangen-Nürnberg) and Prof. Stéphanie Homola (French National Centre for Scientific Research, CNRS, Paris) aiming to investigate hand-memory techniques from a cross-cultural, comparative perspective. The German wing of the project is carried out at CAS-E and financed bv the German Research Foundation Forschungsgemeinschaft, DFG) with a grant of 408.088 Euro.
