More on CAS-E Lecture Series

Friedrich-Alexander-Universität Erlangen-Nürnberg Check out the Steiner 2025 Lecture Series by CAS-E Associated Scholar <u>Dr.</u> Diana Lunkwitz.

The lecture series, organized by the *Research on Anthroposophy Network* (RAN), is dedicated to the centennial of Rudolf Steiner's (1861–1925) death. The series begins by presenting and discussing the relevance and topicality of research into Anthroposophy and Steiner as a person. Lectures then offer introductions as well as in-depth questions and discussions on central and current topics in Anthroposophy research, such as Waldorf education initiated by Steiner, the worldmaking based on anthroposophical concepts in Demeter agriculture, Steiner and his Anthroposophy in the English-speaking world and the SEKEM initiative as a business enterprise between Islam and Anthroposophy. Invited guests will contribute their perspectives from the fields of education, social sciences, history and religious studies. A concluding discussion will thus also highlight the transdisciplinarity and multi-perspectivity in research on Anthroposophy.



This workshop is dedicated to the comparative exploration of hidden knowledges and ritual practices in four dimensions of life among contemporary indigenous groups in South America (and some comparable areas beyond this region): those closely related to sounds (i.e., production of music and other sonic beings), images (i.e., iconography and chromatism), bodies (i.e., rituals and narratives linked to shamanism, healing, witchcraft, and sorcery), and subsistence practices (such as fishing, hunting, agriculture, and herding).

This workshop addresses a subject barely explored in Western-language scholarship: the modernization and "scientization" of the Daoist practice of Internal Alchemy (Neidan) in contemporary Taiwan. This process actually started

in mainland China around the 1940s but went through major developments in Taiwan, where it continues to the present day.

Dr. Lili Di Puppo

Lili Di Puppo's research focuses on anthropology of religion. anthropology-theology, existential risks, sacred sites and human-nature relations. She has conducted fieldwork in Belgium, Russia's Volga-Ural region, Moscow and Georgia. She was an assistant professor of sociology at the Higher School of Economics in Moscow from 2013 to 2022 and a senior researcher at the Aleksanteri Institute, University of Helsinki, in 2023-2024.

Prof. Dr. Steven Engler

Steven Engler is Professor Religious Studies in the Department of Humanities at Mount Royal University in Calgary, Canada, and Affiliate Professor in the Department of Religions and Cultures Concordia University in Montréal. He studies Brazilian esoteric spiritincorporation religions (Umbanda and Kardecism), with publications on Quimbanda, popular Catholicism and Neo-Pentecostalism. He works also meta-theory. on theory, and methodology (primarily grounded theory and coding).

Prof. Marta Hanson

Marta Hanson was Assistant Professor of late imperial Chinese history at the University of California, San Diego (1997-2004), Associate Professor of East Asian medical history in the History of Medicine Department, Johns Hopkins University (2004-2021), and is now a retired faculty member of The Academy at Johns Hopkins (2025present). She publishes broadly about the history of medicine in China, early Sino-European modern medical exchanges, and public health in East Asia.

Dr. Diana Lunkwitz

Diana Lunkwitz is a postdoctoral researcher in Religious Studies and Intercultural Theology at Erlangen-Nürnberg. She completed her degree in theology with a specialization in the study of religions at MLU Halle-Wittenberg. In her dealt with diploma thesis. she questions mission of marginalization in the process of shaping the unity of Christian denominations. Since 2017, she has been leading seminars on topics in the fields of ecotheology and religion and ecology, first in Halle, then as a research associate at the University of Hamburg.

Steven Palmie' obtained his Dr. phil. from the University of Munich in 1989, and his Habilitation in 1999. At present he is Norman and Edna Freehling Professor of Anthropology, The University of Chicago. Among his monographs figure Wizards and Scientists: Explorations in Afro-Cuban Modernity and Tradition (2002), The Cooking of History: How not to Study Afro-Cuban Religion (2013), Thinkina with Ngangas: What Afrocuban Ritual Can Tell Us about Scientific Practice – and Vice Versa (2023).



Prof. Fabrizio Pregadio

Fabrizio Pregadio has taught at different universities in Italy, Germany, the United States, and Canada. His research interests are Daoist thought and religion, alchemy, views of the human being, and self-cultivation traditions. He is the editor of the Encyclopedia of Taoism (2008) and the author of Great Clarity: Daoism and Alchemy in Early Medieval China (2006). He has just published a Dictionary of Taoist Internal Alchemy (2025) and is currently working on a monograph on the Taoist master Liu Yiming (1734-1821).

Dr. Eszter Spät

Eszter Spät has been researching religious minorities and religious practices in the Middle East. Her work focuses on the oral religious tradition of the Yezidis and how its ongoing scripturalization affects the content and structure of Yezidi religion, along with traditional religiosocial hierarchies and institutions. She has conducted extensive fieldwork among Yezidi communities in Northern Iraq, as well as their Christian and Muslim neighbors.

González Varela Sergio is an Assistant professor at the Institute of Ethnology and Cultural Anthropology of the University of Warsaw. He holds a Ph.D. from University of London (awarded in 2009). Before joining the Institute of Ethnology and Cultural Anthropology, he was Associate Professor at Universidad Autónoma de San Luis Potosí, Mexico. He has done ethnographic fieldwork in Brazil, Mexico, and the U.K. He has studied capoeira, an Afro-Brazilian ritualmartial art dance, for more than twenty years and is a leading expert in the field.

Shobhana Xavier is a Tamil (Sri Lankan)-Canadian Religious Studies scholar at Queen's University in Canada. She thinks and writes on contemporary Sufism across global and transnational contexts. Using ethnographic research she maps shrines, pilgrimages, rituals, praxis and gender dynamics. She has written on Canadian and American Sufism and Islam, especially as they intersect with popular spirituality.

I am a Ukrainian academic with a background in Intellectual History and Philosophy. My initial interests lay in Comparative Mysticism and the Philosophy of Religion. Since the mid-2000s, my research has shifted to the study of Sufism in the West and Muslim minorities in Ukraine and Central-Eastern Europe. Over the it has past ten years, incorporated ethnographic methods. I have examined Sufi communities in Germany and Sweden, focusing on conversions, the development of charismatic authority, and spiritual practices.
