Dear Friends,

As the year comes to an end, we wish you all a wonderful festive season and the very best for 2026!

We are thrilled that in 2026, having secured funding from the German Research Foundation (DFG) for four more years (2026–2030), CAS-E will enter into its [Phase II](#). This second phase, starting in April, will feature a reorientation that brings to the fore those practices and power dynamics that mark and/or (de-)legitimize phenomena as esoteric. In doing so, we will structure our research in three streams:

- 1) institutional-political and legal configurations
- 2) configurations of social and media representation
- 3) configurations of efficacy experience.

Among our aims in this phase is the establishment of a methodologically sharpened, empirically grounded, and internationally visible paradigm for analyzing alternative rationalities and esoteric practices as negotiation processes of epistemic orders in a global perspective. Art as Modern Religion

Paul Christopher Johnson is Professor of History, Afroamerican and African Studies, and the Doctoral Program in Anthropology and History at the University of Michigan. Working between historical and anthropological modes on issues from secrecy to diaspora to diversely mediated forms of agency, Johnson has done long-term fieldwork in Brazil and Honduras, and shorter-term fieldwork in the Bronx and Paris. He is the author of *Secrets, Gossip and Gods: The Transformation of Brazilian Candomblé* (Oxford, 2002), *Diaspora Conversions: Black Carib Religion and the Recovery of Africa* (California, 2007), *Ekklesia: Three Inquiries on Church and State* (Chicago, 2018), with Winnifred Fallers Sullivan and Pamela E. Klassen; and, most recently, *Automatic Religion: Nearhuman Agents of Brazil and France* (Chicago, 2021).

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Esoteric Personal

One thing connects how both outsiders and insiders perceive the esoteric realm: the sense that esoteric practices draw upon ideas about reality that somehow differ from what we experience in daily life. Esoteric practices seem to stand apart from other, more mundane realities, regardless of how society embeds or excludes them from a given socio-cultural context or how individuals incorporate them into their lives. Because of this distinction, people find these practices fascinating or strange, attractive or worthy of resistance, seeing them as portraying important truths or dangerous illusions, depending on who observes them. What rarely occurs, however, is that people meet the realm of the esoteric with indifference. With this complex range of attitudes towards the esoteric in mind, our workshop invites humanities and social science researchers to reflect upon their own engagement in the study of esoteric practices. We welcome scholars regardless of whether the term “esoteric” is common in your field, or how others perceive the political, religious, or epistemological status of your research topic.

- What have you learned from studying esoteric practices, both professionally and personally?
- How has this research transformed your understanding of the social and cultural realities you initially set out to study?
- How has it changed your broader perception of sociocultural reality and academic inquiry?
- In what ways has it changed your relationship to your work, discipline, and vision for its future?
- What does it mean for you to study what you study and what personal meaning do you find in studying these subjects?
- Has researching esoteric practices changed you as a person, and if so, how?
